LESSON 25 "Let Every Thing That Hath Breath Praise The Lord" Psalms

OVERVIEW:

Prophecies of the life and mission of Jesus Christ. "The Lord hath dealt bountifully with thee" (Psalm 116:7). "What shall I render unto the Lord for all his benefits toward me?" (Psalm 116:12) "Trust in the Lord." (Psalm 4:5)

The book of Psalms is quoted more often by New Testament writers than any other Old Testament book – over 115 times.

Luke 24:44. And he said unto them, These *are* the words which I spake unto you, while I was yet with you, that all things must be ^afulfilled, which were written in the law of Moses, and *in* the prophets, and *in* **the psalms**, concerning me.

BIBLE DICTIONARY PSALMS

The Psalms collectively are called in Hebrew *Tehillim* or "Praises," but the word mizmor, which denotes a composition set to music, is found in the titles of many of them. The book is the first in order of the "Scriptures" (*Kethubim*) or Hagiographa, which with the Law and the Prophets make up the Hebrew O.T. See *Bible*.

No book of the Old Testament is more Christian in its inner sense or more fully attested as such by the use made of it than the Psalms. Out of a total of 283 direct citations from the Old Testament in the New, 116 have been counted from this one book. Much of Christianity by its preference for the Psalms reverses the custom of the Synagogue, which judged the psalmists' inspiration inferior to that of the prophets, and set Moses on high above them all, so that no prophet might teach any new thing but only what was implicitly contained in the law.

Titles are added to some of the Psalms, but it is open to question whether these are as old as the words to which they are attached. They mainly refer to the manner in which the words were to be sung or accompanied. Some Psalms were to be accompanied by stringed instruments (*Neginah, Neginoth* Pss. 4, 54 - 55, 61, 67, 76, and Hab. 3: 19), others by wind instruments (*Nehiloth* Ps. 5); while such titles as "Set to *Alamoth*" (Ps. 46) = maidens, or "Set to *Sheminith*" (Pss. 6, 12) = the octave, seem to imply that there was singing in parts. Some of the titles appear to be intended to indicate the character of the Psalm, as *Maschil* = giving instruction (Pss. 32, 42, 44-45, 52 - 55, 74, 78, 78, 88 - 89, and 112), *Michtam*, rendered by some *Golden Psalm* (Pss. 16, 56 - 60); while *Shiggaion* (Ps. 7) with *Shigionoth* (Hab. 3: 1) may refer to the irregular erratic style of the compositions, and *Gittith* = belonging to Gath (Pss. 8, 81, 84) may relate either to the melody or to the instrument used in the performance. The other titles are all probably names of tunes, well known at the time, to which the Psalms were appointed to be sung.

Seventy-three of the psalms are ascribed to David, and so it was natural that the whole collection should be referred to as his, and that this convenient way of speaking should give rise in time to the popular belief that "the sweet psalmist of Israel" himself wrote all the so-called Psalms of David. Sacred psalmody is ascribed to him in general terms in 1 and 2 Chr., the accompanying instruments also being called "instruments of David," as in Neh. 12: 36 and Amos 6: 5. In some cases in which a psalm is ascribed to David in the Hebrew, it is certain that he could not have written it, and it has been concluded that the Hebrew titles are sometimes inaccurate.

Psalm 100:4-5: 4 Enter into his gates with ^athanksgiving, *and* into his ^bcourts with praise: be thankful unto him, *and* bless his name. 5 For the LORD *is* good; his mercy *is* everlasting; and his truth *endureth* to all generations.

Psalm 103:2-4, 8-11, 17-18: 2 Bless the LORD, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits: 3 Who ^aforgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy ^bdiseases; 4 Who ^aredeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies; 8 The ^aLORD *is* ^bmerciful and gracious, slow to ^canger, and plenteous in mercy. 9 He will not always chide: neither will he keep *his* ^a*anger* for ever. 10 He hath not dealt with us after our sins; nor rewarded us according to our iniquities. 11 For as the heaven is high above the earth, *so* great is his mercy toward them that fear him. 17 But the ^amercy of the LORD *is* from everlasting to everlasting upon them that fear him, and his righteousness unto children's children; 18 To such as keep his covenant, and to those that remember his commandments to do them.

The Scriptures:

Psalm 19:7-11: 7 The ^alaw of the LORD *is* ^bperfect, ^cconverting the soul: the ^dtestimony of the LORD *is* ^esure, making ^fwise the ^gsimple. 8 The statutes of the LORD *are* right, ^arejoicing the heart: the commandment of the LORD *is* ^bpure[•], ^cenlightening the eyes. 9 The fear of the LORD *is* clean, enduring for ever: the ^ajudgments of the LORD *are* ^btrue *and* righteous altogether. 10 More to be ^adesired *are they* than ^bgold, yea, than much fine gold: sweeter also than honey and the honeycomb. 11 Moreover by them is thy servant ^awarned: *and* in ^bkeeping of them *there is* great reward.

(Psalm 119 is divided into twenty-two sections corresponding to the twenty-two letters of the Hebrew alphabet. Each section is titled with the corresponding name of the Hebrew letter and its English transliteration. This designation shows that in the Hebrew the psalm forms an acrostic (a poem or work of prose in which the initial letter of each line forms its own word or a peculiar pattern). In Psalm 119 each of the twenty-two sections has eight lines. Every line in each section begins with the same letter of the Hebrew alphabet. In other words, verses 1-8 all start in the original with *aleph*, verses 9-16 with *beth*, and so on. In an age when literature was often memorized and transmitted orally such devices were a valuable aid to memory. Old Testament Student Manual, p. 311)

ALEPH

Blessed are they who keep the commandments.

Psalm 119: 1 ^aBLESSED are the undefiled in the way, who walk in the law of the LORD.

2 Blessed *are* they that keep his testimonies, *and that* ^aseek him with the whole heart.

76 Let, I pray thee, thy merciful kindness be for my comfort, according to thy word unto thy servant.

77 Let thy tender mercies come unto me, that I may live: for thy law *is* my delight.

78 Let the proud be ^aashamed; for they dealt perversely with me without a cause: *but* I will meditate in (upon) thy precepts.

79 Let those that fear thee turn unto me, and those that have known thy testimonies.

80 Let my heart be sound in thy statutes; that I be not ashamed.

⊃CAPH

All the Lord's commandments are faithful.

81 My soul ^afainteth for thy salvation: *but* I hope in thy word.

82 Mine eyes fail for thy word, saying, When wilt thou comfort me?

83 For I am become like a ^abottle (or waterskin) in the smoke; *yet* do I not forget thy statutes.

84 How ^amany *are* ^bthe days (ie of affliction) of thy servant? when wilt thou execute ^cjudgment on them that persecute me?

85 The proud have ^adigged pits for me, which *are* not after thy law.

86 All thy commandments are faithful: they persecute me wrongfully; help thou me.

87 They had almost consumed me upon earth; but I forsook not thy precepts.

88 Quicken me after thy lovingkindness; so shall I keep the testimony of thy mouth.

LAMED

O Lord, save us, for we have sought thy precepts.

89 For ever, O LORD, thy ^aword is settled in heaven.

90 Thy ^afaithfulness *is* unto all generations: thou hast established the earth, and it abideth.

91 They continue this day according to thine ordinances: for all are thy servants.

92 Unless thy law had been my delights, I should then have perished in mine affliction.

93 I will never forget thy precepts: for with them thou hast quickened me.

94 I am thine, save me; for I have sought thy precepts.

95 The wicked have waited for me to destroy me: but I will consider thy testimonies.

96 I have seen an end of all perfection: but thy commandment is exceeding broad.

MEM

The Lord's law and his testimonies should be our meditation all the day.

97 O how love I thy law! it *is* my meditation all the day.

98 Thou through thy commandments hast made me wiser than mine enemies: for they are ever with me.

99 I have more ^aunderstanding than all my teachers: for thy testimonies *are* my ^bmeditation.

- 100 I understand more than the ^aancients, because I keep thy precepts.
- 101 I have ^arefrained my feet from every evil way, that I might keep thy word.
- 102 I have not departed from thy judgments: for thou hast taught me.
- 103 How sweet are thy words unto my taste! yea, sweeter than honey to my mouth!
- 104 Through thy precepts I get understanding: therefore I hate every false way.

JNUN

The Lord's word is a lamp unto our feet.

105 Thy ^aword *is* a ^blamp unto my feet, and a ^clight unto my path.

106 I have sworn, and I will perform *it*, that I will keep thy righteous ^ajudgments.

107 I am afflicted very much: quicken me, O LORD, according unto thy word.

108 Accept, I beseech thee, the freewill ^aofferings of my mouth, O LORD, and teach me thy judgments.

109 My ^asoul *is* continually in my (thy) hand: yet do I (and I do) not forget thy law.

110 The wicked have laid a snare for me: yet I erred not from thy precepts.

111 Thy testimonies have I taken as an heritage for ever: for they *are* the ^arejoicing of my heart.

112 I have inclined mine heart to perform thy statutes alway, even unto the end.

DSAMECH

Depart from evildoers and keep the commandments of God.

113 I hate *vain* thoughts: but thy law do I love.

114 Thou art my ^ahiding place and my shield: I hope in thy word.

115 ^aDepart from me, ye evildoers: for I will keep the commandments of my God.

116 Uphold me according unto thy word, that I may live: and let me not be ashamed of my ^ahope.

117 Hold thou me up, and I shall be ^asafe: and I will have respect unto thy statutes continually.

118 Thou hast trodden down all them that err from thy statutes: for their deceit is falsehood.

119 Thou puttest away all the wicked of the earth *like* ^adross: therefore I love thy testimonies.

120 My flesh trembleth for fear of thee; and I am afraid of thy judgments.

O Lord, we are thy servants; give us understanding.

121 I have done judgment and justice: leave me not to mine oppressors.

122 Be surety for thy servant for good: let not the proud oppress me.

123 Mine eyes fail for thy salvation, and for the word of thy righteousness.

124 Deal with thy servant according unto thy mercy, and teach me thy statutes.

125 I am thy ^aservant; give me understanding, that I may know thy testimonies.

126 It is (And the) time for thee, (O) LORD, (for me) to work(;): for they have made void thy law.

127 Therefore I ^alove thy commandments above gold; yea, above fine gold.

128 Therefore I esteem all thy precepts concerning all things to be right; and I hate every false way.

DPE

The Lord's testimonies are wonderful.

129 Thy testimonies *are* wonderful: therefore doth my soul keep them.

130 The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth (they give) ^aunderstanding unto the simple.

131 I opened my mouth, and panted: for I longed for thy commandments.

132 Look thou upon me, and be ^amerciful unto me, as thou usest to do unto those that love thy name.

133 ^aOrder my steps in thy word: and let not any iniquity have ^bdominion over me.

134 Deliver me from the ^aoppression of man: so will I keep thy precepts.

135 Make thy face to ^ashine upon thy servant; and teach me thy statutes.

136 Rivers of waters run down mine eyes, because they keep not thy law.

YTZADDI

The Lord's law is the truth.

137 ^aRighteous *art* thou, O LORD, and upright *are* thy judgments.

138 Thy testimonies *that* thou hast commanded *are* ^arighteous and very faithful.

139 My ^azeal hath consumed me, because mine enemies have forgotten thy words.

140 Thy word *is* very pure: therefore thy servant loveth it.

141 I am small and despised: yet do not I forget thy precepts.

142 Thy righteousness *is* an everlasting righteousness, and thy law *is* the ^atruth.

156 Great are thy tender mercies, O LORD: quicken me according to thy judgments.

157 Many are my persecutors and mine enemies; yet do I not decline from thy testimonies.

158 I beheld the transgressors, and was ^agrieved; because they kept not thy word.

159 Consider how I love thy precepts: quicken me, O LORD, according to thy lovingkindness.

160 Thy word is true from the beginning: and every one of thy righteous judgments endureth for ever.

WSCHIN

Those who love the Lord's law have peace.

161 Princes have persecuted me without a cause: but my heart standeth in awe of thy word.

162 I ^arejoice at thy word, as one that findeth great spoil.

163 I hate and abhor lying: but thy law do I love.

164 Seven times a day do I praise thee because of thy righteous judgments.

165 Great ^apeace have they which love thy law: and nothing shall offend them.

166 LORD, I have hoped for thy salvation, and done thy commandments.

167 My soul hath kept thy testimonies; and I love them exceedingly.

168 I have kept thy precepts and thy testimonies: for all my ^aways *are* before thee.

ΠTAU

All the Lord's commandments are righteousness.

169 Let my cry come near before thee, O LORD: give me ^aunderstanding according to thy word.

170 Let my supplication come before thee: deliver me according to thy word.

171 My lips shall utter praise, when thou hast taught me thy statutes.

172 My tongue shall speak of thy word: for all thy commandments are righteousness.

173 Let thine hand help me; for I have chosen thy precepts.

174 I have longed for thy salvation, O LORD; and thy law is my delight.

175 Let my soul live, and it shall praise thee; and let thy judgments help me.

176 I have gone astray like a lost ^asheep; seek thy servant; for I do not forget thy commandments.

The Temple:

Psalm 5:7: But as for me, I will come *into* thy house in the multitude of thy mercy: *and* in ^athy fear (or reverence) will I worship toward thy holy ^btemple.

Psalm 15:1-3: 1 LORD, who shall ^aabide in thy tabernacle? who shall dwell in thy holy ^bhill (of Zion)? 2 He that ^awalketh uprightly, and worketh righteousness, and speaketh the truth in his heart. 3 *He that* ^abackbiteth not with his tongue, nor doeth evil to his ^bneighbour, nor taketh up a reproach against his neighbour.

Psalm 24:1 THE ^aearth *is* the ^bLORD's, and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein. 2 For he hath founded it upon the seas, and established it upon the floods. 3 Who shall ^aascend

into the hill of the LORD? or who shall stand in his ^bholy place? 4 He that hath ^aclean ^bhands, and a ^cpure ^dheart; who hath not lifted up his soul unto ^evanity, nor ^fsworn ^gdeceitfully. 5 He shall receive the blessing from the LORD, and righteousness from the God of his salvation. 6 This *is* the generation of them that seek him, that seek thy face, ^aO Jacob. (or even Jacob) Selah. 7 ^aLift up your heads, O ye gates (generations of Jacob); and be ye lift(ed) up, ye everlasting doors; and the King of glory shall become in. 8 Who is this aKing of bglory? (And) the LORD strong and mighty; the LORD mighty in battle(, who is the king of glory, shall establish you for ever. And he will roll away the heavens; and will come down to redeem his people; to make you an everlasting name; to establish you upon his everlasting rock). 9 Lift up your heads, O ye gates (generations of Jacob); even lift them up (your heads), ye everlasting doors (generations); and the (Lord of hosts, the king of glory. (Even the king of glory shall come in. 10 Who is this aKing of glory? The LORD of hosts, he is the King of glory. (Even the king of glory shall redeem his people, and shall establish them in righteousness.) Selah. (Probably *selah* was used to direct the singer to be silent, or to pause a little, while the instruments played an interlude or symphony. Old Testament Student Manual, p. 311)

Psalm 27:4: One *thing* have I desired of the LORD, that will I seek after; that I may ^adwell in the ^bhouse of the LORD all the days of my life, to behold the ^cbeauty of the LORD, and to ^denquire (or contemplate) in his temple.

Psalm 65:4: Blessed *is the man whom* thou choosest, and causest to approach *unto thee, that* he may dwell in thy ^acourts: we shall be satisfied with the goodness of thy house, *even* of thy holy temple.

Psalm 84:1-2, 4, 10-12: 1 HOW ^aamiable *are* thy tabernacles (Heb lovely is thy dwelling place), O LORD of hosts! 2 My soul longeth, yea, even ^afainteth for the courts of the LORD: my heart and my flesh crieth out for the living God. 4 Blessed *are* they that dwell in thy house: they will be still praising thee. Selah.10 For a day in thy courts *is* better than ^aa thousand (ie a thousand elsewhere). I had rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God, than to dwell in the tents of wickedness. 11 For the LORD God *is* a ^asun and ^bshield: the LORD will give ^cgrace and glory: no good *thing* will he ^dwithhold from them that ^ewalk uprightly. 12 O LORD of hosts, blessed *is* the man that trusteth in thee.

Gratitude:

Psalm 116:12 What shall I ^arender unto the LORD *for* all his benefits toward me? 13 I will take the cup of salvation, and call upon the name of the LORD. 16 O LORD, truly I *am* thy ^aservant; I *am* thy servant, *and* the son of thine handmaid: thou hast loosed my bonds. 17 I will offer to thee the sacrifice of thanksgiving, and will ^acall upon the name of the LORD. 18 I will pay my vows unto the LORD now in the presence of all his people, 19 In the ^acourts of the LORD's house, in the midst of thee, O Jerusalem. Praise ye the LORD.

Trust in the Lord:

Psalm 4:5: Offer the ^asacrifices of righteousness, and put your trust in the LORD.

Psalm 5:11: But let all those that put their trust in thee rejoice: let them ever ^ashout (Heb sing) for joy, because thou defendest them: let them also that love thy name be joyful in thee.

Psalm 9:10: And they that know thy ^aname will put their ^btrust in thee: for thou, LORD, hast not forsaken them that seek thee.

Psalm 18:2: The LORD *is* my ^arock, and my ^bfortress, and my deliverer; my God, my ^cstrength, in whom I will ^dtrust; my buckler, and the horn of my salvation, *and* my high tower.

Psalm 56:11: In God have I put my trust: I will not be afraid what man can do unto me.

Psalm 62:8: ^aTrust in him at all times; ye people, pour out your heart before him: God *is* a refuge for us. Selah.

Psalm 118:8-9: 8 *It is* better to ^atrust in the LORD than to put ^bconfidence in man. 9 *It is* better to trust in the LORD than to put confidence in princes.

(Joseph Smith was still in his teens when he learned of the prophetic significance of the book of Psalms. We can virtually identify the very moment—it was during the night and early morning hours of the 21 and 22 September 1823, when Moroni first visited him. It was Oliver Cowdery who, after a lengthy conversation with the Prophet, preserved this knowledge for us. In the Pearl of Great Price account, Joseph Smith only tells us of a few of the passages of scripture quoted and explained by Moroni, adding that "he quoted many other passages of scripture, and offered many explanations which cannot be mentioned here" (JS-H 1:36-41). In his account of what the Prophet told him, Oliver lists more than two dozen such passages, among which are five of the Psalms. We will briefly examine each. They are Psalms 91:6: 100; 107; 144; and 146:10. Though Moroni's explanation of these passages has not been preserved for us, their interpretation in the context of Moroni's instruction to Joseph Smith will be obvious. Psalm 91:6. This is a messianic psalm, the introductory verses of which are refrains of praise and rejoicing in the protection afforded Israel through faith in God. The sixth verse speaks of pestilence and of a "destruction that wasteth at noonday." Moroni placed the passage in the same context as Joel's prophecy that the moon would turn to blood and the stars fall from heaven (see Joel 2:31), and Isaiah's prophecy of the earth reeling to and fro as a drunken man (see Isaiah 24:20). Oliver's account records, "The Lord will bring to the knowledge of his people his commandments and statutes, that they may be prepared to stand when the ... nations tremble, and the destroying angel goes forth to waste the inhabitants at noon-day: for so great are to be the calamities which are to come upon the inhabitants of the earth, before the coming of the Son of Man the second time, that whoso is not prepared cannot abide; but such as are found faithful, and remain, shall be gathered with his people and caught up to meet the Lord in the cloud, and so shall they inherit eternal life." Moroni would obviously have emphasized to Joseph Smith his role in restoring the "commandments and statutes" of the Lord that a people might be prepared to stand when the Lord comes. Psalm 100. 1 MAKE a joyful noise unto the LORD, all ye lands. 2 Serve the LORD with ^agladness: come before his presence with ^bsinging. 3 Know ye that the LORD he is God: it is he that hath ^amade us, and not we ourselves; we are his people, and the ^bsheep of his pasture. 4 Enter into his gates with ^athanksgiving, *and* into his ^bcourts with praise: be thankful unto him, and bless his name. 5 For the LORD is good; his mercy is everlasting; and his truth endureth to all generations. This Psalm begins with the announcement that all the earth must declare the Lord and serve him joyfully. It is an invitation for the worthy of all nations to "come before his presence," which is an Old Testament phrase meaning "to come to the temple." The witness of the Psalmist is that the truths taught therein endure from generation to generation, unchanged. This, we learn from Moroni, was the day for which David longed and often prayed. Further, we are told that David knew that such a day could not come "until the knowledge of the glory of God covered all lands, or all the earth." Psalm 107. 1 O GIVE thanks unto the LORD, for *he is* good: for his mercy *endureth* for ever. 2 Let the redeemed of the LORD say so, whom he hath ^aredeemed from the hand of the enemy: 3 And gathered them out of the lands, from the east, and from the west, from the north, and from the south. 4 They ^awandered in the ^bwilderness in a solitary way; they found no city to dwell in. 5 Hungry and thirsty, their soul fainted in them. 6 Then they ^acried unto the LORD in their ^btrouble, and he delivered them out of

their distresses. 7 And he led them forth by the right way, that they might go to a city of habitation. 8 Oh that men would praise the LORD for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men! 9 For he satisfieth the longing soul, and filleth the hungry soul with goodness. 10 Such as sit in ^adarkness and in the shadow of death, *being* bound in affliction and iron; 11 Because they ^arebelled against the words of God, and contemned the counsel of the most High: 12 Therefore he brought down their heart with labour; they fell down, and *there was* none to help. 13 Then they cried unto the LORD in their trouble, and he saved them out of their distresses. 14 He brought them out of darkness and the ^ashadow of death, and brake their bands in sunder. 15 Oh that *men* would praise the LORD for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men! 16 For he hath ^abroken the gates of brass, and cut the bars of iron in sunder. 17 Fools because of their transgression, and because of their iniquities, are afflicted. 18 Their soul abhorreth all manner of ^ameat; and they draw near unto the gates of death. 19 Then they cry unto the LORD in their trouble, and he saveth them out of their distresses. 20 He sent his word, and healed them, and delivered *them* from their destructions. 21 Oh that men would praise the LORD for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men! 22 And let them sacrifice the sacrifices of ^athanksgiving, and declare his works with ^brejoicing. 23 They that go down to the sea in ships, that do business in great waters: 24 These see the works of the LORD. and his wonders in the deep. 25 For he commandeth, and raiseth the stormy wind, which lifteth up the waves thereof. 26 They mount up to the heaven, they go down again to the depths: their soul is melted because of trouble. 27 They reel to and fro, and stagger like a drunken ^aman, and are at their wits' end. 28 Then they cry unto the LORD in their trouble, and he bringeth them out of their distresses. 29 He ^amaketh the storm a calm, so that the waves thereof are still. 30 Then are they glad because they be quiet; so he bringeth them unto their desired haven. 31 Oh that *men* would praise the LORD for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men! 32 Let them exalt him also in the ^a congregation of the people, and praise him in the assembly of the elders. 33 He turneth rivers into a wilderness, and the watersprings into dry ground; 34 A fruitful land into barrenness, for the ^awickedness of them that dwell therein. 35 He turneth the ^awilderness into a standing water, and dry ground into watersprings. 36 And there he maketh the hungry to dwell, that they may prepare a city for habitation; 37 And sow the fields, and plant vineyards, which may yield fruits of increase. 38 He blesseth them also, so that they are multiplied greatly; and suffereth not their cattle to decrease. 39 Again, they are ^aminished and brought low through oppression, affliction, and sorrow. 40 He poureth contempt upon princes, and causeth them to wander in the wilderness, where there is no way. 41 Yet setteth he the poor on high from affliction, and maketh him families like a flock. 42 The righteous shall see *it*, and rejoice: and all iniquity shall stop her mouth. 43 Whoso *is* ^awise, and will observe these *things*, even they shall understand the lovingkindness of the LORD. This Psalm speaks of affliction and distress which would come upon Israel because they "rebelled against the words of God." It promised a day when they would be freed from their bondage of "darkness" and gathered from the lands of the "east, and from the west, from the north, and from the south," a time when the Lord would "send his word" and heal them, after which they would be expected to "declare" or testify of "his works with rejoicing." The Psalm also promises that for those so gathered the Lord would turn the "desert into pools of water, and parched earth into springs of water." Here the hungry, it was prophesied, would settle and establish a city to dwell in and be blessed with abundant harvests. Here they were to multiply "greatly," for the promise was that the Lord would make "him families like a flock." Commenting on this, Oliver wrote: "Most clearly was it shown to the prophet, that the righteous should be gathered from all the earth: He knew that the children of Israel were led from Egypt, by the right hand of the Lord, and permitted to possess the land of Canaan, though they were rebellious in the desert, but he further knew that they were not gathered from the east, the west, the north and the south, at that time; for it was clearly manifested that the Lord himself would prepare a habitation, even as he said, when he would lead them to a city of refuge." Psalms 144:11-12 11 Rid me, and deliver me from the hand of strange children, whose mouth speaketh ^avanity, and their right hand *is* a right hand of falsehood: 12 That our

sons *may be* as plants grown up in their youth; *that* our daughters *may be* as corner stones, polished *after* the similitude of a palace: and 146:10 The LORD shall reign for ^aever, *even* thy God, O Zion, unto all generations. Praise ye the LORD. Here we again find David praying for that day when Israel will be freed from the hand of foreigners that her sons might be "as plants grown up in their youth" and their daughters "as corner stones, polished after the similitude of a palace." Only then, according to the Cowdery account of Moroni's discourse, will their sons and daughters prophesy, their old men dream dreams, and young men see visions. This was then given as the context of Psalm 146:10, which announces a day when the Lord would reign forever in Zion. Joseph F. McConkie, Joseph Smith Translation: The Restoration of Plain and Precious Things, Chapter 6.)

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
