President Spencer W. Kimball

The possession of riches does not necessarily constitute sin. But sin may arise in the acquisition and use of wealth... 'for the love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith..' (1 Tim.:10-11)

- 2. Plead with Lord for power to overcome
- 3. Resolve transgressions with priesthood leaders
- 4. Seek power from words of prophets
- 5. Remember repentance brings forgiveness

Supplement #4 (optional material)

A danger in a church as well-organized as ours is that we will fulfill all of our callings in pretty much the same way that those who held them before us fulfilled them. There is nothing wrong with that unless the Lord has something else in mind. The fact that the Lord has called us to a responsibility, rather than someone else, suggests that we ought to find out if he has something special in mind for us to do.

"Wherefore, brethren, seek not to counsel the Lord, but to take counsel from his hand. For behold, ye yourselves know that he counseleth in wisdom, and in justice, and in great mercy, over all his works." (Jacob 4:10)

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
