General Comments on Amos 5-6

This is the final warning, the final confrontation mentioned at the end of the last chapter, the kingdom of Northern Israel will receive from the Lord before He puts his hand to work in bringing about their captivity at the hands of their enemies. There will be no more warnings.

Comments on Amos 5

¹ Hear ye this word which I take up against you, even a lamentation, O house of Israel. ² The virgin of Israel is fallen; she shall no more rise: she is forsaken upon her land; there is none to raise her up. ³ For thus saith the Lord GoD; The city that went out by a thousand shall leave an hundred, and that which went forth by an hundred shall leave ten, to the house of Israel.

v1-3 Amos tells the kingdom of Northern Israel they will be decimated and their land forsaken.

⁴ For thus saith the LORD unto the house of Israel, Seek ye me, and ye shall live: ⁵ But seek not Bethel, nor enter into Gilgal, and pass not to Beersheba: for Gilgal shall surely go into captivity, and Bethel shall come to nought. ⁶ Seek the LORD, and ye shall live; lest he break out like fire in the house of Joseph, and devour it, and there be none to quench it in Bethel. ⁷ Ye who turn judgment to wormwood, and leave off righteousness in the earth,

v4-7 The Lord warns the people of Israel to reject the false idolatries their kings have set up at Bethel and Gilgal and to return to Him, their true God, or they will be destroyed.

⁸ Seek him that maketh the seven stars and Orion, and turneth the shadow of death into the morning, and maketh the day dark with night: that calleth for the waters of the sea, and poureth them out upon the face of the earth: The LORD is his name: ⁹ That strengtheneth the spoiled against the strong, so that the spoiled shall come against the fortress. ¹⁰ They hate him that rebuketh in the gate, and they abhor him that speaketh uprightly. ¹¹ Forasmuch therefore as your treading is upon the poor, and ye take from him burdens of wheat: ye have built houses of hewn stone, but ye shall not dwell in them; ye have planted pleasant vineyards, but ye shall not drink wine of them. ¹² For I know your manifold transgressions and your mighty sins: they afflict the just, they take a bribe, and they turn aside the poor in the gate from their right. ¹³ Therefore the prudent shall keep silence in that time; for it is an evil time.

v8-13 Israel should seek after the Lord, their Creator, Who has power over all things, and can topple seemingly strong city walls (v. 8-9). Israel hates the one who calls out their bad behavior (v. 10) when they exploit the poor. But, from their wealth when they build great stone houses and plant vineyards, they will not have a chance to use them (v. 11-12). The wise person among them keeps their opinions to themselves, because they live among evil people (v. 13).

v13 This is a warning to the righteous among corrupt Israel to not jeopardize their lives, because they will be persecuted or murdered for speaking the truth, cp. Micah 7:5-6. The meaning here is that in an evil society in decay, you cannot trust anyone around you, you can only trust in the Lord, who is faithful. The evil people will not repent, so don't risk your well-being.

¹⁴ Seek good, and not evil, that ye may live: and so the LORD, the God of hosts, shall be with you, as ye have spoken. ¹⁵ Hate the evil, and love the good, and establish judgment in the gate: it may be that the LORD God of hosts will be gracious unto the remnant of Joseph.

v14-15 The warning to the good people among Israel continues: if they are good and just, then they will be among the remnant of Joseph spared at the invasion.

¹⁶ Therefore the LORD, the God of hosts, the LORD, saith thus; Wailing shall be in all streets; and they shall say in all the highways, Alas! alas! and they shall call the husbandman to mourning, and such as are skilful of lamentation to wailing. ¹⁷ And in all vineyards shall be wailing: for I will pass through thee, saith the LORD.

v16-17 The destruction will come and when it does there will be wailing all throughout Northern Israel. None of the wicked will be spared the Lord's Justice.

¹⁸ Woe unto you that desire the day of the LORD! to what end is it for you? the day of the LORD is darkness, and not light. ¹⁹ As if a man did flee from a lion, and a bear met him; or went into the house, and leaned his hand on the wall, and a serpent bit him. ²⁰ Shall not the day of the LORD be darkness, and not light? even very dark, and no brightness in it?

v18-20 The Lord warns people who tempt the Lord to reveal Himself, because it will be a day of destruction, where none will escape.

²¹ I hate, I despise your feast days, and I will not smell in your solemn assemblies. ²² Though ye offer me burnt offerings and your meat offerings, I will not accept them: neither will I regard the peace offerings of your fat beasts. ²³ Take thou away from me the noise of thy songs; for I will not hear the melody of thy viols. ²⁴ But let judgment run down as waters, and righteousness as a mighty stream. ²⁵ Have ye offered unto me sacrifices and offerings in the wilderness forty years, O house of Israel? ²⁶ But ye have borne the tabernacle of your Moloch and Chiun your images, the star of your god, which ye made to yourselves. ²⁷ Therefore will I cause you to go into captivity beyond Damascus, saith the LORD, whose name is The God of hosts.

v21-27 The Lord is disgusted with their hypocritical sacrificial offerings (v. 21-22) and festivals (v. 23, cp. 4:4-5). Rather, the Lord wants them to keep the Law of Moses and be just in their dealings, so they will be blessed (v. 24). Are you like your fathers who offered the Lord alone sacrifices (v. 25), or do you offer sacrifices to idols also (v. 26)? Because of this, the Lord will send them into exile as captives (v. 27).

v21-23 The people are perfectly willing to attend the religious festivals for the food, music and dancing. But, they ignore the intended spiritual aspects. They are only there to party and have fun, so the Lord rejects them, because they do the same with all of their idols.

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
